
thank you for your letter. Thank you very much indeed.

I will try now to explain my ideas more clearly, and in a foreign language too, which doesn't simplify the matter.


I am afraid this first group of papers shall not be enough, at least for my purposes. It can, of course, be enough for yours, would your opinion be a negative one. May I ask you to let me know what you think about it, in any case? I am quite prepared to be disappointed. Disappointements are my occupational desease, and at this point I can only be surprised by a positive reaction.

The main problem is to make myself understood, and to choose among my papers those that may keep your interest alive. A hard task. My discovery, or, better said, my re-descovery, was made step by step, and it is very difficult to see the importance of the result whithout following the complete process from the beginning. Especially as the beginning was something so obsolete and despised as the Zodiac. Nowithstanding, the very fact that the Zodiac is a written document of unknown origin becames at the end of the upmost importance.

To spare your time, I think it would be better, at least for the moment, to take for granted some postulates, clearly suggested by the structure of the Zodiac, They can be explained (and I will explain them) logically with the "game of twelve" and with the "game of number one reproducing itself." But before coming to these more elaborate mathematical speculations, I suppose you should get acquainted with the structure of the Zodiac (the complete structure: from Ptholemy to our times, astrologers worked on dilapited relics). And here it is:



4) The two series are interwined in a particular way, and the beginning and the end of each serie don't coincide. On the contrary, we have to accept the fact (explained later by 'the game of twelve) that the motion serieinserts itself in the a very particular point of the space, serie: the fifth element of the space serie (or, if we consider a circle of 360°, at the 120° of the space serie) (Please remember that the 'direction' of the Zediscal structure is always anticlockwise)



5) While the space serie appears to be 'monotonous', and its elements 'fixed' once and for ever, each element of the motion serie indi= cated by Latin letters 'occupies' three different positions in the space serie (called first, second and third position), and the two elements indicated by Greek letters occupie only two positions (the first and the third). The different behaviour of alpha and omega will be explained by the game of twelve.

In spite of the absurdity of the postulate (especially to an astronomer's mind) the three positions of the motion elements are in fact the key of the very ingreous Zodiacal code.

In the circle figure of each serie, we have to consider the parallel elements, and the opposite in elements: for instance, the element 1 is parallel to the element 12 and opposite to the element 7. The element 2 is parallel to the element 11 and opposite to the element 8, and so on. We can clearly see that four elements of the serie (1 and 12, and 6 and 7) are parallel and consecutive. We shall call them the extremes (1 and 12) and the anti-extremes (4 and 7), while we shall callthe other eight elements 'lateral', or 'side elements'. We shall see later that the 'behaviour' of the side elements is quite different from the behaviour of the extremes and anti-extremes (the same thing happens with the elements of the bacterial cell. As a matter of fact, I reached the happy end of a very critical period of my analysis keeping an eye on the Zodiac and the other one on François Jacob's La Logique du vivant)

6) Thanks to the pattern of the different positions, the motion serie appears to duplicate itself inside the space serie.

The succession of the first and second position of the Latin lettered elements is quite simple and logicals, because it follows the alphabetical progress of the same letters. The first position is indicated by the letter written in black. The second position, by the letter written in red. You will see that each black letter has a red reflection of itself in the parallel space elementa creating a zigzag pattern, with the exception of the letters D and E, where we have, in four space elements, a succession of two reds followed by two blacks. I am afraid that for the moment I have no logical or mathematical explanation of this fact, however clearly related with the 'reproduction twist' of the biochemical cell.

5 = While the space serie appears to be 'monotonous', and its elements 'fixed' once and for ever, each element of the motion serie indicated by Latin letters 'occupies' three different positions in the space serie (called the first, second and third position), and the two elements indicated by Greek letters occupy only twhe positions (the first and the third).

You will probably begin to wonder what a 'position' is; for the moment, please accept the hypothesis that they are the key of a very ingeneous code, and they offer the possibility of reading whatever message the code contains.

6 = Thanks to the pattern of the first and second position, (see figure 1 and 2) the motion serie appears to duplicate itself inside the space serie. This pattern follows a fairly simple logicals sequence : beginning with alpha, and ending with omega, each element of the motion serie is placed at the right and at the left of the circle, completing step by step the alphabetical succession. In the figures, the first position is indicated by the letter written in black, and the second position by the letter written in red.

You will see that each black letter has a red reflection of itself in the parallel space element, creatingy a zig-zag pattern, with the exception of the letters D and E, where we have, in four space elements, a succession of two reds followed by two blacks. I am afraid that for the moment I have no logical or mathematical explanation for this fact, however the loop of the four w motion elements seems clearly related with the reproduction twist of the biochemical cell. And, in the course of all my further analysis, The Zodiacal code always seems to make me reach the conclusion that 'what begins with two ends with four'. So I accepted this anomaly as an important suggestion of the message.

7 = Now we are looking at fig. 2 and at the complete pattern of the first and second positions. Let us suppose we are spies, and fairly sure to have an important cipher-code in our hands. What can we do to decode it? I will spare you the story of my trials and errors. At the end, I succeeded following the thread of Ariadne, and quite easily I found my way out of the labyrinth. The Zodiacal code begins to 'sing', as the computers experts say, when you decide to connect with a line differents points of the code itself, after having established a logical rule beforhand.

For instance, we can consider all and only the first positions and trace a line that runs from alpha to omega through all the Latin letters in their alphabetical succession. The result is shown at figure 3. We have a loop of four elements at both ends.

Let us try now with a line connecting all the second positions. You can see it at figure 4. An we are due to a surprise : a sort of click produces an intertwining at the upper end, while there is still the loop at the lower end.

Another way of using the thread of Ariadne is connecting all the first and second positions with a line which runs from top to bottom and vice-versa. I already sent you this pattern with my first letter, the result is what I suppose mathematicians call 'The Hamilton line'.

Enough for the moment, because most of all I don't want to bore you. Tomorrow I will try to explain the fascinating pattern of the third position, which transforms the Zodiacal circle in a tridimensional sphere. I think I will write to you three letters in quick succession and then wait for an answer. Please don't worry about my norale. In the xerocopy number 2 you have the complete Zodiacal code of the first two position of the motion series. At this point you can tell me "So what?". I know that I am gambling against an enormous amount of odds, but even if I never touched a roulette table in my life, let the wheel spin.

I will not explain in this letter the fascinating pattern of the third position, which will transform the Zodiacal circle in a tri-dimensional sphere. I prefer to tell you how, having detected a 'code' in the Zediac, I tried, and succeeded, in reading it, or in making him 'sing'. Myths have always been a great help for me (I am the Italian translator of Robert Graves Greek myths, by the way). See what I do in the xerocopies 3 and 4. But...but: let us suppose it is really a game, a mathematical and geometrical game. It is not so childish as it seems. I am sure you have a marvelous coputer handy. Ask ha it if, given the two temes twelve series I told you about in my first letter, it is possible to change a bit their disposition (for instance, motion serie beginning at the second space serie element, and not the fifth) and to obtain a cascade of so legical results. In figure 3 you can see the complete paptern of the third positions. Here, and afterwards, the third position will be always indicated by a letter outside the circle. These positions are relied one to another in groups of three. The Zodiac indicates that the motion serie elements bounce and rebounce in a triangle figure. Alpha; jumping in the first space element, deplaces C that jumps in the third element, and C deplaces A that jumps in the fifth space element, where the first jump of alpha took place. The result is an intertwining of identical triangles in each half of the Zodiacal circle.

And now that we have established all the positions, with the help of Ariadne's thread we can do some very interestin things. We have to think of a logical rule beforhand. Let us say that we want to connect with a line the three positions of each motion element, taking in consideration, step by step, each element and its opposite. See figure 3. A is the opposite of D. We trace a line that begins and ends with the black (first position) A, passing through the second and the third position. We do the same thing with D. I am sending now to you the second group of my papers. I hope the first one is safely in your hands.

I will try to explain the thir position of the motion serie elements. The astrological tradition indicated (and still indicates for the common astrologers) only five 'third positions' out of twelve. So, the 'movement' of the third position comes out directly from the second position. Were we chess players, I would say that we 'move the reds'.



here is the third and last group of my papers, concerning the exagonal inner structure of the Zediac. I debated with myself whether to tell you something about the 'game of twelve' or not, and I decied to let it aside for the moment. Perhaps because writing you these long letters nearly exhausted me.

In the Zodiac, everything that is 'positive' in a space element, becames 'negative' in the opposite space element. For instance, in space element number 3 we find the first position of L and the second position of A. We shall say that L and A are 'positive' in the third position, and they will became 'negative' in space element number 9 (opposite to 3). In the figure, the negative letters have a green colour.

If we consider only the first two positions and their negative reflexes, each space element appears like a bex containing four elements: in fact, a square.

Thanks to the third position, a strange phenomen happens; as if a spinning force compresses the space elements (taken in two group of six) and pushes three of these elements downside, and three upside. In these group of three-by-three, ther is always a positive letter of the first space element of the row which slide at the upper end of the following space element, while the corresponding negative element slides at the bottom of the following space element. Dear Mrs. Morpurgo:

Thank you for the copies of your work which you present in a very detailed, systematic, and concise way. You have obviously given much thought to these matters, and are very intelligent. Despite all this, I am not able to understand the purpose of all the patterns which you discern in the zodiac. One can indeed find a number of interesting geometrical manipulations given a twelve-pointed star, but I do not see that they lead to a clear-cut connection to any known or previously unknown fact. For example, I see no relationship to the arrangement of the solar system at all.

An objection to the type of analysis you make is that interesting manipulations can be found with any complex geometrical figure, whether intended or not. A similar situation occurs with the works of William Shakespeare, where if one is clever enough one seems to find code messages in his texts. It is just that given so much freedom, it is possible to find something intriguing, improbable to happen by chance. But given so many chances, something improbable will occur. You have to show that some apparently striking result is remarkably improbable. I don't see this in your work.

Nevertheless, I am impressed with the intellectual skills you have applied to your ideas. Perhaps someone else will recognize something profound in the results.

thank you for your letter of December 26th, which is less than I hoped but far more than I expected. I should now say once more Barateful I am, and make myself scarce for ever.

Before doing that, anyway, I think that some of your objection deserve an answer, even if short and academic.

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You ask me to show that some apparently striking reult is remarkably improbable. I can tell you that I began my research exactly at this point. The improbable result I found was not a theorical, but a practical one. Putting my hands on the Zodiac for the first time, some seven years ago, I discovered, after a lot of checking and re-checking, that it worked. I mean, astrology works. Imperfectly, incompletely (thabks God) , but it works, while as I bas loop book

This discovery upsetted me. I was, and I am, rational. I refused to accept the fact that such a ridiculous gadget, born in times of 'magic' superstition, could give me a fairly good percentage of correct answers. After a long fight against the evidence of what I was seeing. I thought that saying 'no' and forgetting about it, just out of spite and in the name of the Goddess Reason, was stupid and, indeed, irrational. We can't close our eyes her pecause it is more easy, and more convenient, to do so. On this basis, I began to decode the Zodiac. An here lays the difficulty of making myself understood. First of all because nobody , but NCBODY at a ceartin scientific level will ever accept that astrology may be taken seriously. Then, because the collateral proofs I am collecting are to be found in literature, philosophy, psychanalysis and so on; and, at least for the moment, I only contacted (briefly, alas) a biologist who despised mathematics, a mathematician who ignored biochemistry, and neither remembered havingread Homerus or Leibniz or Rainer Maria Rilke, or Freud. Last but not least, what lays beyond the Zodiac is so terrifying (even if fasci=

odds of an eclipse occurring or not, but you can only say when the eclipse woll occurr.

The idea of applying this rule to everything is unpleasant. Very unpleasant. And if man built up, through ages, a strong censorship against it, no wonder. But here, at least in my opinion, lays the possibility of the beyond Copernic revolution. To make any big jump ahead, science was always compeled to accepet some unpleasant discovery, like the no-geocentricity of the solar system or the second principle of the thermodynamic. Trying to avoid this kind of discoveries is probably the best method to keep anthropocentrical hopes alive, and we are still anthropocentrical minded.

There is certainly no relationship, to an estronomer's eye, between the Zodiac and the solar system. The Zodiac doesn't describe what the solar system is, but how it works. And I am afraid it works more or less like the bacterial cell.
