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

few days age, an Italian newspaper quoted some lines from your Future of man

Dear Mr. Lederberg,

two years ago, I quoted in a book of mine few lines translated from "Man and his future". I was then tempted to contact you, and never dared to do so. I found the courage to write to you now, after a long conversation I had with Mr. Romolo Saccomani, a biologist who met you in Pavia some years ago. Mr. Saccomani told me that you are perhaps one of the very few persons who may lock with interest at what I am doing.

To explain the research I am engaged in, I shall have to make a long story short, with the risk of not being clear enough. Nevertheless, I shall try.

Four years ago, I began to observe and to analyze one of the most ancient among the scientific written documents, called the Zodiac. Little by little, I discovered that the same Zodiac was not a primitive instrument devised by the old astronomers, neither a gadget to 'see' the future, but a numerical and geometrical code based on two-ways mathematics. To reconstruct the complete pattern of the code, (which was lost during centuries of ignorance and wrong manipulation) I had to follow some appaling logical processes, certainly unknown to traditional astrologers.

The Zodiacal code, as it happens with all codes, conceals a message, and I am now deciphering this message, which step by step is leading me towards some fascinating and upsetting discoveries. I am afraid that I am bringing to light a terrifying instrument of knowledge, but an instrument all the same, and of great importance.

I cannot take the burden of this discovery all by myself. I am not a scientist, and I have no means to follow practically and usefully the routes that the Zodiacal message clearly indicates. I tried to contact scientists, without success, at least until now. Not only nombody wants to consider or discuss something even remotely related with astrology, but also, as I realizes during a long serie of disappointment I have to fight against a strong censorship built up through centuries of anthropocentrical thought. In spite of Galileo's revolution, man still hopes to be the center of the universe, and behaves accordingly, even in the scientific field. Very often, I felt that the reactions of the few scientists or philosophers I could spoke with,

were not dictated by reason, but by pure, naked fear.

I know quite well that the Zodiacal message is fascinating and horrible at the same time. First of all, the Zodiac itself seems to be of unknown but not earthly origin. As far as I can see now, it tells more or less that we are not unique in the universe; that mankind is probably compelled to reproduce itself in a long serie of cycles and in a long chain or distinct but not different solar systems; that each cycle is doomed by the rising of entropy, and conditioned by a 'message' which is structured among the astronomical elements as the biological message is structured among the elements of the bacterial cell; and that, unbelievable as it may look at first eight, the structure of the bacterial cell is not the result of a long chain of chances, but of an inescapable mathematical process.

To explain the last point, I am following now an uncommon mathem matical path. This research is far from completed, but even now may be perhaps appealing for a highly speculative mind. I wonder whether you could be interested in seeing a few pages of this work, as well as some papers concerning the decoding of the Zodiac.
